Engaging students in the Response Process



The response process is about readers:

- playing a role in making meaning
- expressing their individual responses, understandings, and wonderings
- reflecting on what they bring to the text as readers

Choose a rich text that:

- is interesting and meaningful to your students
- compels readers to talk
- has multiple interpretations



Connecting to the QEP

- Use language for exploring, expressing and developing thoughts, feelings and imagination.
- Develop and use meaning-making strategies.
- Identify some structures and features of a text.
- Share ideas and points of view.
- Acknowledge and support different interpretations of the same text.
- Ask and answer questions.




